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




The Titles of the Booklets are:

SECRETARIES REPORT

The past 17 months since March 2020 has been a challenging time for many of us. Now we can at last hope that the lifting of restrictions will increase after allowing indoor dining in Restaurants, Hotels and Pubs. By the end of August Ireland will hopefully have more than 85% of the population fully vaccinated, we await the advice of the HSE/NEPHET regarding numbers allowed to gather in a large room. Provisionally we are looking for a suitable venue to hold a Public Meeting on 6th or 7th November, but current restrictions only allow 100 people in the room. Paul and myself, have been meeting many of the Ostomy Companies over the past couple of Months and they like yourselves are looking forward to being able to meet up again and give you advice and samples to try. However, if only 100 people allowed in a room it is not viable to hold a meeting. We are encouraged by the recent comments of the Chief Medical Officer that we can now look forward to a greater easing of restrictions as the percentage of the population Vaccinated increases. The Autumn issue of Ostomy Ireland News will contain all the information regarding a Public Meeting on the 6th or 7th November at a venue in Dublin once it is safe to do so.

World Ostomy Day is on Saturday 2nd October 2021 and will be celebrated all over the World. OAI will be celebrating the 10th World Ostomy Day in DCU – Dublin City

University, St Patrick's College Campus, Dublin 9. Because of restrictions in numbers, we are looking at the Local Group Coordinators along with two others from their group attending, Representatives of the Stoma Care Nurses – HSE and OSTOMY Company nurses, Medical Professionals, HSE Personnel, Representatives of the Ostomy Companies, and members of the OAI Executive. The OAI Ostomy Visitor Training Programme along with the three booklets which have been produced this year will be launched at this event. It is also hoped approval of our charitable status can be announced.

We have a large database of members names going back to the days of IA Ireland in 2018. We have continued to communicate with members on the Database even when membership annual subscriptions have not been renewed. However, because of GDPR compliance regulations all members must each year complete an application form with their details and tick the consent box and send the application form to the Treasurer. This is especially important when renewing and making payment by EFT through your Bank or Now since 1st August 2021 you can log onto the OAI Website **www.ostomyireland.ie** complete an application form and pay by Paypal. If you wish to make a donation there is a separate link to make a donation on Paypal. Especially when paying by EFT you must notify us you have made a payment and



send a completed application form to the Treasurer, Ostomy Association of Ireland, 6 Marian Place, Tullamore, Co.Offaly, R35 KD78. . If you were previously a member your details would be on the database. However, if a new member and you make a payment by EFT but do not make contact by returning a completed Application Form we are unable to send you a receipt and Membership Card. OAI have set a Final Date to renew your membership which is now 31 August 2021. If not renewed by this Date you will no longer be on the OAI Database. Over the past couple of weeks renewal notices have been sent out to members whose membership has not been renewed and I wish to thank so many of you who have brought your membership in line with the GDPR compliance regulations. It is important that you know as a paid-up member you are covered by the OAI Insurance Policy which provides all Local Support Groups with Insurance Cover for

the activities they organise each year. If you do not have a membership card which is renewed each year, then you are not covered by the OAI Allianz – Community & Voluntary Insurance Policy. Please If you have still not renewed your membership for 2021 do so as soon as possible as only paid up members will receive a communication from OAI post 31 August 2021 in compliance with GDPR regulations.

The Moldova Project continues to be a great success and thanks to everyone no matter how large of small your donation of Ostomy Products has been, it has made a huge difference and we hope we can continue to receive surplus or unwanted supplies of Ostomy Products you may have. Group Coordinators may be willing to accept the ostomy products you wish to donate and arrangements can be made to get them to Tullamore. More information on the Moldova Project in this issue.

OAI hope to undertake a Survey/ Questionnaire again at the end of August/early September. A lot of valuable information was obtained from the last survey/questionnaire we conducted in 2018. In this survey/questionnaire we are seeking information which will hopefully assist us in our quest to have all Ostomates deemed eligible to receive a Medical Card as a Primary Entitlement due to the Life Long Medical Condition Ostomates Endure.



It is only when we have accurate information on the lives of our members and the difficulties many Ostomates experience in their daily lives that the OAI can lobby the Government Department of Health and Department of Social Protection. The cost of Ostomy Appliances and Medication that many Ostomates require each month is a major financial burden especially when you do not have a medical card.

The survey/questionnaire is in five sections :

Section Three: Travel

Section Four: IT and Communications

Section Five: Fitness, Leisure & Recreation

Please be assured that all returned Survey/Questionnaires will be treated as highly confidential and protected by GDPR obligations and will be shredded once information is analysed.





Over the last number of months we have seen people in our Dublin and Belfast clinics and the feedback has been super positive so we have taken a decision to have a regional approach and to offer clinic visits in Dublin, Cork, Belfast, Limerick and Waterford initially".

“Ostomates’ Rights are Human Rights – Anytime and Anywhere!”



Since 1993 the World Ostomy Day WOD is celebrated every three years on the first Saturday in October. In 2021 we are celebrating a special anniversary: It is the 10th WOD and it will again unify ostomates and International Ostomy Association, IOA member associations in the whole world.

For each WOD one of the three IOA regions :

- The Americas
- Europe
- Asia & South Pacific

Takes the responsibility for organising World Ostomy Day – WOD

This year the motto for WOD 2021 was proposed by the European Ostomy Association EOA.

The Motto for WOD 2021 is :

“Ostomates’ Rights are Human Rights – Anytime and Anywhere!”

The Executive Council of the European Ostomy Association EOA chose the Motto for this years WOD from among nine different proposals which were suggested by EOA members. The “Charter of Ostomates Rights”, issued in its first version by the IOA Coordination Committee 1993, defines the needs and the care of ostomates to live a life in dignity. It is necessary that ostomates receive the information and care which will enable them to live a self-determined and independent life and to participate in all decision-making processes.

In 2020 and again in this year 2021 ostomates in nearly the whole world faced the threat of the SARS-Cov2-virus (Covid 19) and its consequences for health and daily living. Many activities of Ostomy Associations could not take place in the usual way. Chapter Meetings with personal contacts was not possible, visiting service to hospitals had to be stopped in most cases, Conferences and Congresses had to be cancelled or postponed.



Often the personal care needed by Ostomates when at home for the first time after surgery by a Stoma Care Nurse was considerably reduced or not available. The EOA even heard about problems in some countries where the resources of the health system had been concentrated on Covid 19. The access to affordable appliances had been limited which created a very big challenge for ostomates and ostomy associations.

In these times it is one of the great concerns of the EOA to put the focus on the Charter of Ostomates Rights : The defined needs and care are not anything at all! They describe necessary needs of a special group of people. The rights of Ostomates and People with a Disability are an own right, and all these rights are Human Rights. Ostomates matter, People with a Disability matter!

So with the WOD Motto 2021 Ostomy Associations throughout the World will underline that Ostomates Rights are not negotiable. They must be respected by governments, politicians, healthcare authorities, companies, and suppliers, by doctors and nurses, by every Human Being and by every Society – even in uncertain times.

Charter of Ostomates' Rights

The Charter of Ostomates' Rights presents the special needs of Ostomates and the care they require. They have to receive the information and care which will enable them to live a self-determined and independent life and to participate in all decision-making processes. It is the declared objective of the International Ostomy Association that this Charter shall be realised in all Countries of the World.

The Ostomate shall:

1. Receive preoperative counselling to ensure that they are fully aware of the benefits of the operation and the essential facts about living with a stoma.
2. Have a well-constructed stoma placed at an appropriate site, and with full and proper consideration to the comfort of the patient.
3. Receive experienced and professional medical support and stoma nursing care in the preoperative and postoperative period both in hospital and in their community.
4. Receive support and information for the benefit of the family, personal caregivers and friends to increase their understanding of the conditions and adjustments which are necessary for achieving a satisfactory standard of life with a stoma.
5. Receive full and impartial information about all relevant supplies and products available in their Country.
6. Have unrestricted access to a variety of affordable ostomy products.
7. Be given information about their National Ostomy Association and the services and support which can be provided.
8. Be protected against all forms of discrimination.
9. Receive assurance that personal information regarding their ostomy surgery will be treated with discretion to maintain privacy, and that no information about their medical condition will be disclosed by anyone possessing this information, to an entity that engages in the manufacture, sales or distribution of ostomy products, nor shall it be disclosed to any person that will benefit, directly or indirectly, because of their relation to the commercial ostomy market without the expressed consent of the ostomate.

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MY LIFE MY STOMA


SANDRA FARMER



Hi my name is Sandra. I am 36 and I am an Ostomate. My story began back in 2008, Just over a year after having my first baby, when I was diagnosed with Ulcerative Colitis. I started on Pentasa sachets and Questran. After a couple of flare ups and steroid stints I had been doing fairly ok. Then on my second pregnancy in 2010 I became very ill. My daughter was born in June 2011 and medication started all over again. Many steroid stints along with Imuran, 6mp, Humira and finally Infliximab. Unfortunately for me, none of these medications worked and I became a prisoner in my own home until finally in January 2013 my life changed for the better.

I had emergency surgery to remove my entire large bowel creating an ileostomy. This surgery was my lifesaver. Although there were many struggles mentally, having my bag, although seen as a disability was actually an ability for me. An ability to live life again. To do all the little

things I'd taken for granted like food shopping, taking the kids to the park, walking the dog. All of these had been a struggle for so long, always looking for places with bathrooms, having to use staff toilets midway through food shopping because I just couldn't make it through a full shop, and finally this was no longer a problem. My kids had their mammy back and I felt like me again. By the end of 2014 I hit another struggle. My rectum became diseased and it was back to trying medications to help.

In this time I had come across the IA which is now The Ostomy Association of Ireland. Going to their events really opened my eyes to many products available out there and also introduced me to so many people with ostomys. Hearing other peoples stories really gave me a boost. This made me want to help others who were going through the same as myself.



I took it upon myself, through crohns and colitis facebook groups, to reach out to anyone needing advice or just a chat. In this time I met a lovely 16 year old girl about to go through surgery. I went to the hospital to visit her before surgery. I showed her products I used and spoke about how great life can be with an ostomy. I also went to visit her after surgery and again when she got home and felt it really helped her get through the tough times. I am also on a facebook group for parents of children who have cancer. I am on this group as my son had cancer as an infant and is now 12 years clear. On this group I met a lovely family whose 5 year old son has 2 ostomies. I organised to meet up with them and have a chat. Myself and this boy had great fun comparing bags. This was huge for me and for the family.


In 2017 it was decided my rectum needed to be removed and closed and I was beyond happy to have this done because there was no way I was giving up "Stomy" (the name I'd given to my stoma). At the end of 2017. I had won a gym membership and almost gave it to a friend, but hearing other people tell me it was possible with the right supportwear, I was only delighted to get myself in shape. Which leads me to my new job. I am now a Product specialist with Ceannaire Medical promoting Suportx hernia support garments and Trio Ostomy Care products. These products not only help with my everyday ostomy appliance but also with my everyday exercise plan. The Trio products are silicone which make them

so kind and gentle on the skin with no residue left behind, that I have no skin issues at all. The Suportx hernia support belt not only prevents me from developing a hernia while training, but it's also comfortable enough to wear all day while keeping up with my busy schedule. If it was not for my ostomy I would not be here to see my kids grow up, to enjoy the good things in life, and if it was not for The Ostomy Association of Ireland, I would have never met the amazing people that changed my outlook on life with an Ostomy.

I hope that anyone struggling can get some comfort from my story. The road is long but my god it was worth it.

MY LIFE MY STOMA MADELINE GRANT



If you change the order of the words in the title to - My stoma my life — it depicts what often happens when our body image is altered, our focus narrows.

‘The Body Keeps the Score’ by Bessel Van Der Kolk and ‘When the Body Says No’ by Gabor Maté, are some of the books that have enabled me to understand how memories of traumatic life experiences, are held within our bodies. If these experiences are not properly processed and integrated it can result in the development of physical illness or illnesses of the psyche.

This has been the story of my life. Unexplored and unexpressed grief that was held in my body for years and as a result, I believe, my immune system was compromised and I developed Ulcerative Colitis (UC). The first symptoms of UC appeared following the deaths of two people within my immediate family within a 7 month period. My method of coping was to keep very, very busy, therefore minimising the time I had to reflect on what had happened. Yes, there was a family history of Ulcerative Colitis – my mother developed

UC after the death of her baby son who died at full term. I was born 2 years later, so my memories of my mother include her running very quickly past me to the nearest loo!! She never got professional advice re her UC, she was just treated by our family GP. My mother feared the prospect of ever having a stoma. When her adult son died as a result of a drowning accident, she developed cancer within 5 months and died 7 weeks after diagnosis. She was only in her 50's.

A few months later at the age of 19, I had my first colonoscopy which diagnosed Ulcerative colitis. I struggled with UC over the next 20 years, at times being very ill. How normal running to the loo 15-20 times became, while at the same time trying to get my young children ready for school. Why would anyone put up with this??? It is the nature of chronic illness, that over its duration, we accept, without recognising it, a reduced quality of life.



One of my memories around this time is of an appointment I had with my consultant a few weeks before Christmas begging him to give me something to get me through the festive period. My children were young and I wanted to be well enough to do what needed to be done.



Eleven months later I had surgery to.. as I saw it then.. give me back a 'quality of life'. I was living finally, without an illness that had taken up a substantial part of my life. I was the patient who bounced back after the surgery, kept smiling and kept very, very busy. The well-meaning phrases of 'I don't know how you do it' 'You are great' became some of my most hated expressions to hear. I didn't necessarily feel great, I did it because I had no choice. I still had not acknowledged feelings of loss and angerI was unaware of them....so my body had to shake me to the core again. A year after my first surgery, I was on the way home from a close friend's funeral when I started to get abdominal pains. I ended up in hospital with a twist in my bowel. I was very ill after this surgery. I was in ICU, on a ventilator, with many complications. It was at this point I knew I needed to change how I processed and dealt with different events in my life. This was not easy as my body was so programmed to act/react in a specific way. I was the person who, just got on with things. I did not dare show any signs of vulnerability. I needed to learn that it is not a weakness to be vulnerable and to say 'it is / I am NOT OK'.

Adrienne Rich summed it up in this line from one of her poems 'There must be some among us with whom we can sit down and weep and still be counted as warriors'. I read many books. I started to meditate. I went to a wonderful Buddhist retreat centre on the side of a cliff on the Beara Peninsula. I studied to become a play/creative arts therapist. The creative arts got me out of my head and into my body. No words were required, the creative mediums were all I needed. I gave myself the permission to be vulnerable. As Brené Brown says 'Vulnerability is the birthplace of creativity, innovation and change'.

I wanted to learn more about the grieving process so I completed a MSc in Bereavement Studies with the Irish Hospice Foundation. Grief is not something we feel just at times of death. There are many different life events, that can leave us with a sense of loss, two of these being illness and surgery. When we grieve we are also grieving for future losses. We all have a vision or an expectation that life might pan out in a certain way, and then an illness/surgery occurs and those things we assumed would happen, now may not, or we perceive they may not. I had refused to give myself the permission to grieve for the many losses I had experienced, one of those being the loss of my body as I knew it.

Creative Arts Workshops



This personal learning, plus my work as a stoma nurse - visiting patients in hospital and at home following bowel surgery, hearing their stories - inspired the development of Creative Arts Workshops for those who have had bowel surgery resulting in a stoma. A friend and wonderful therapist agreed to run them with me. By limiting the size of the groups, a sense of intimacy and openness was created, which helped those who attended to feel safe and ... the creative mediums did the rest.



It is so important to acknowledge that some people will need a 'leg up', to help them over the hurdle of dealing with the losses related to illness and surgery and the loss of body image. Our previous ways of coping with loss and grief in our lives, may interfere with how we process these changes. Acknowledging these ways of coping can be the start of developing a healthier mind/body relationship.

Our main funding for these workshops came from St Vincent's University Hospital. As a result of Covid 19 these workshops have stopped but I hope that I can get some up and running in the near future.

Woodland Therapy Room - bringing nature into therapy



To top up my Qualification as an Accredited Play/Creative Arts therapist I have completed a Post Grad diploma in Integrative Counselling and Psychotherapy to enable me to work therapeutically on a one-to-one basis with adults who are struggling post-surgery. I am also completing an Environmental Arts Therapy Course so I can bring my therapy out into nature if that is what a client would find more helpful. This course is an experiential one, giving me 'hands on' experience, of the power of nature, to provide and to heal.

Nature has a way of giving us what we need at any given time. It has been a huge support to me over the years – being out in its wildness and its absolute beauty reminds me of how

insignificant I am in the greater scheme of things and what seems like an insurmountable obstacle is actually manageable if seen from another perspective.

Albert Einstein described how we need to free ourselves from the delusion of being separate from nature and everything around us and he says our task must be to widen our circle of compassion to embrace all living creatures and the whole of nature in its beauty.

My reading, studying, self- exploration, interactions with others, and life experience have taught me that I and only I, am responsible for how I live my life – despite the fact that very difficult events, sometimes life changing ones, can and do occur, it is me, myself, who is responsible for how I respond to them. I have choices. I intend to continue to explore the literature and any research available that investigates the relationship between previous traumatic events and illness and how our bodies 'keep the score'.

The stoma does not stop me from doing anything. It is the reason I have lived to the age I am now. I am very grateful for the joy I feel when I am out in nature and also for my acknowledgement of how my body has held onto memories deep within its core, in the muscles, in the bones and the fact I have given myself the compassionate permission to explore and go with these emotional memories in a non- judgmental way.

Of course, having a loving immediate and extended family, both 2 legged and 4 legged, really is the icing on the cake.





MOLDOVA PROJECT

The Institute Centre of Health Cimislia provides palliative care for patients suffering with various forms of cancer. They have 80 ostomates who have had surgery because of Bowel, Colorectal or Bladder Cancer and now have a Stoma.


Following the appeal last September by Elena Cecati a Moldovan who is living and working in Dublin for ostomates in Ireland to donate any surplus or unwanted ostomy products for ostomates living in Moldova. OAI members responded most generously and so far 10 consignments of ostomy products have been sent to Moldova. The first consignment sent was last November and the most recent two weeks ago.



Delivery of Ostomy Products

The Institute Centre of Health Cimislia has created a Network with 6 other Hospitals and a Residential Home for elderly people and has distributed ostomy products to them. Some members also donated Diapers or Sanitary Pads and these were also most welcome. The range of ostomy products donated and sent to Moldova have been gratefully received and the reaction

has been amazing. Doctors have said they had never seen nor known about some of the ostomy products OAI members donated. The feedback has highlighted the following ostomy products – Stoma pouches/bags in different shapes and forms, Adhesive remover sprays and wipes, Barrier creams, sprays and wipes, Flange extender strips to apply around the base of the pouch/bag and seals to help prevent leakage. The ostomy products members have donated have contributed so much to help improve and change the lives of so many ostomates in Moldova. They can now hope to have a Quality of Life again and to be able to Live Life to the Full again.

Prior to receiving donations of ostomy products from ostomates in Ireland, ostomates in Moldova suffered greatly with shortage and non availability of Stoma pouches/bags in pharmacies and when available the cost was so expensive and for many very difficult to afford and to be able to purchase them. Ostomates tried to save on the use of their stoma pouches by sometimes not wearing a pouch/bag and leaving their stoma exposed with no protective cover. If they happened to fall asleep, they often woke up and found their stoma had discharged waste while they were asleep



and they had discharge on their body and clothes. It does not bear thinking about. It was very stressful and embarrassing.

Ostomates also sometimes did not wear a pouch because of skin irritation caused when removing a pouch/bag without any adhesive remover spray or remover wipes. It was a painful and most unpleasant procedure.

Ostomates now after receiving the many different ostomy products donated are now able to leave their homes because they feel safe and are less fearful of having a problem with leakage and are starting to Live Life to the Full again. They can now think about going out of their homes for a walk, go shopping and are able to go and visit family and friends without being worried they would have leakage or a burst stoma pouch/bag.

One of the ostomates who has benefitted from the ostomy products sent is a 71yr old lady called Cecati Zinovia, a retired nurse who was diagnosed with bowel cancer last year and had ostomy surgery in March this year.




